Sight Loss Sunday

As advertised in our last newsletter, we're encouraging churches to set a Sunday aside this autumn to celebrate the unique gifts and talents that are offered by the people with sight loss in their congregations.

Sight Loss Sunday is taking place on Sunday 17 October, to coincide with World Sight Day, and we'll be making a plethora of text and audio/visual resources available free of charge on our website to help you observe it, including:

- Suggested readings
- Prayer resources and hymn/worship song suggestions related to the readings
- Sermon ideas
- Resources for children's groups
- Videos of people with sight loss demonstrating how they play their part in church life
- A reflection from a person with sight loss (video and text)

Our suggested readings will also be available to order in hard copy in braille and large print. If someone in your church



would like to do a reading, but has never had the opportunity before, we hope these hard copy readings will allow them to do so on Sight Loss Sunday.

You don't need to use all of the resources, and indeed we would encourage you to be led by people with sight loss in your congregation. If one of them would like to preach a sermon, for example, or give testimony, you might not need to use the sermon materials or the videos. Our aim is for Sight Loss Sunday to appeal to all denominations and church practices.

Sight Loss Sunday Top Tip

People with sight loss have as much to contribute to church life as people who are sighted. If someone with sight loss in your church expresses a wish to read Scripture, lead prayers, preach, be part of the musical life of the church, arrange flowers, lead a homegroup, offer prayer support or otherwise play an active part in the life of the church, don't discount it, but try to find a way to make it happen.







New "Focus On ..." sessions

Our first three "Focus On ..." sessions have been extremely well-received, and we are working towards uploading these recordings to our YouTube channel.

Our sessions for September, October and November will be as follows:

Homegroups: this session is mainly for leaders, but participants are welcome as well. We'll explain why people with sight loss might be reluctant to join a homegroup and how you can overcome this. In particular, we will cover transportation to and from the homegroup, social and environmental factors, and how to ensure members with sight loss have the right material at the right time.

Braille: not all people with sight loss read braille; but for those who do, it's a vital lifeline. In this session, we will explain how braille compares with print, where to obtain braille resources and how you can produce your own. We will



also discuss things to consider when working with braille resources.

The Environment: as the days get shorter, it's more important than ever to think about how people with sight loss move around your church building. We will cover how to determine the type and quality of lighting that works best for someone with sight loss, how to indicate steps (both inside and outside), making doors safer and the placement of chairs. We will also discuss how long canes and guide dogs help people with sight loss and the differences between the two approaches.
